Here are the top five things that I will miss about being this Section's President:


- #5... Getting to call the Board meeting to order.

Each soul is responsible for the whole world.



Access to safe drinking water, sanitation, and adequate wastewater disposal are issues of key concern to large portions of the world's population, especially in developing countries. Approximately one out of every five human beings, or 1.1 billion people, do not have consistent access to safe drinking water. Annually over 12 million people die due to inadequate or unsafe drinking water supplies, including over 3 million children who die from waterborne diseases.

Water for People is one of several non-governmental organizations that attempt to tackle the challenges of providing safe drinking water and sanitation services to the developing world. 

"It helps to be a geek. Bonneau Dickson, who has christened his home elixirs Chateau Bonneau, for instance, is a sanitary engineer who lives in Berkeley. 'Wine is an anaerobic process, like sludge digestion,' he said, an observation not likely to be repeated in *The Wine Spectator*. The ceiling of his third-floor walk-up is dented from an errant stopper blown off a vigorously fermenting chardonnay. His kitchen is a welter of calibrated cylinders, acidity kits and pH meters. His décor consists of 65 wine-filled carboys, six-gallon glass containers, which have subsumed nearly every inch of his apartment. His preoccupation, however, does wonders for his social life. 'As soon as I started making wine, I noticed I had more friends,' he said."


